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A Brief History of 60 years of the Path in Hawaii



After spending November 16th and 17th for the missionary visit to Maui, they arrived at Hilo Airport, where they were greeted by many members. Every member was inspired by the sincerest parental heart shown through the missionary visits to five churches, which continued until November 22nd.

Visit by Mrs. Oai Nakayama, President of Women's Association

In 1954, after the completion of the Dedication Service for the establishment of the Mission Headquarters, the Hawaii Women's Association held its inaugural ceremony and appointed Mrs. Ayako Inoue its chairperson. It carried out the activities that geared to nurture and deepen its members' faith and to engage in the Hinokishin activities for the community. Five years later, Mrs. Nakayama, the president of the Women's Association, commenced the missionary visitation to the churches within the Hawaii diocese (more than thirty churches) spending thirty-six days from November 13th till December 19th.

Mrs. Nakayama was then accompanied by its three members; Machi Matsumura, Harue Umetani, and Omine Yamada. It was over such a long period of time, and it was a larger-scale missionary visitation by the Women's Association that was never seen in the history of the Women's Association. It could be due to Hawaii's deeper relationship with Japan that Hawaii might have been spotlighted with fervent desire to revive the foreign mission efforts more so because, by then, fourteen years had passed since the end of the World War II, and the diplomatic relationship between Japan and America had been restored.

Mrs. Nakayama and the attendants intimately encouraged the members of the Hawaii Women's Association through the lectures, discussions, Otefuri practices, and service instrument practices at the Mission Headquarters and thirteen other local churches. On November 19th, they conducted a special general meeting, and, in the afternoon of the same day, they enjoyed a picnic with many local members and participants at Ala Moana Beach Park.

On the Island of Hawaii, they, together with its local members, enjoyed a picnic at Kilauea National Park. There wasn't a single member of the Hawaii Women's Association who was not inspired by the gentle and thoughtful words and lectures of the president of the Women's Association. The members made pledges that they would spiritedly devote themselves to the future activities.

March Monthly Service Prayer

From tomorrow on, the Gatherings will also be held at other venues in Hawaii. We shall take these opportunities to further uplift our momentum to advance toward Oyasama's 130th Anniversary with a firm sense of mission as Yoboku. Also the Boys & Girls Association Spring Camp will be held from the 21st to the 23rd of this month with the General Meeting scheduled for the 22nd. We will firmly engage in passing on our joy of faith to our children who will shoulder the future of the path so that the path in Hawaii shall continue for endless generations.

Together we vow to accord with the intention of God the Parent, whose desire is for all humankind to live the Joyous Life, and as instruments of Oyasama we will walk firmly on the path of single-hearted salvation and single-heartedness with God here in Hawaii. Especially with the 60th Anniversary of the Mission Headquarters just two months away, each and every one of us is firmly determined to make decisive efforts to grow spiritually. May You, God the Parent, accept our sincerity, and we ask that You guide us further towards the advancement of the Path in Hawaii and the reconstruction of the world into a Joyous Life World where everyone will live together in harmony helping and caring for one another even a day sooner. Together with all present, I sincerely pray that You bless us so.

Mission HQ March Monthly Service Sermon

Head Minister of Pearl Church

This year Pearl Church will be celebrating its 80th Anniversary since its establishment in 1934. Just last year in November, we were able to purchase the property in the back of our church. For a long time we always wished that we could own that back property and finally with the support and assistance of our church members, the seeds of sincerity planted by our predecessors, the first and second head ministers of Pearl Church, and the mysterious guidance and blessing of God the Parent and Oyasama, unexpectedly, we were able to purchase the property.

The mysterious blessing of God the Parent and Oyasama, was shown through the good timing of how this was accomplished with people essential to make the purchase having returned to Honolulu from afar and having all key members of the church agree to the purchase and support it with unity of mind.

The first head of Pearl Church, Rev. Tsugi Nagayama, before embracing the faith around 1925, was a kimono fabric peddler in Manchuria. She suffered from an eye disease and became blind. She was resigned to the fact that she did not have much of a future. One day a Tenrikyo head



minister who administered the sazuke on her, suggested that she return to Jiba. Upon resolving to return to Jiba she received a miraculous blessing of restored eye sight.

During the year of Oyasama's 40th Anniversary, about 90 years ago, she returned to Jiba and enrolled in the 6-month *Bekka*, which was a longer version of the present Spiritual Development Course. Gradually, she became strongly committed to do missionary work. For some unknown reason she developed a strong desire to do missionary work in Hawaii. However, her church was reluctant to send a 50-year old illiterate and single woman to a foreign country. She consulted with her *Bekka* instructor, who suggested that she go to Tengen Church located near Jiba and discuss the matter with the head minister there. So she went there.

The first head minister of Tengen Church, Rev. Asakichi Nakao, who would be my great grandfather, for some reason embraced her goal and began filing her documents to go to Hawaii. During the three years before departing for Hawaii, she devoted herself to missionary work staying at Tengen Church. She was so committed that she fasted and went to the Overseas Department many times to ask for their permission. She once told the Tengen head minister, she would commit *hara-kiri* if she was not able to go to Hawaii and started to do a fast.

Finally, her visa was granted. Some of the Tengen Church members went with her to see her off at Kobe Harbor.

After arriving in Honolulu, she rented a house in Palama on Austin Lane near Tamashiro Market and did missionary work wearing a kimono coat called *haoli* with the Tenrikyo crest on it and a pair of straw *zori*. She did ministry in Kalihi, Aiea, Waipahu and the Leeward areas.

In three years after arriving in Honolulu, she received sanction to establish Pearl Church in September 1934 which was, of course, 80 years ago. After World War II ended, Rev. Tsugi Nagayama passed away at the age of 73 in 1949. My parents Rev. Yoshinobu and Tomiko Nakao arrived in 1954 to take over the church.

My parents raised five children and moved from Palama to an old house in Kaimuki in 1962 where Pearl Church is

now located. The sanctuary was built in the living room. I was seven at that time.

I remember as a kid, I loved to eat bread, but we hardly had any bread to eat at that time. One day someone gave us 10 loaves at one time and I was so happy. I thought we could have bread for a long time. But my parents gave away almost all of the bread. I asked, “why are you giving away our bread?” I don’t know exactly what they said, but I know they scolded me, saying something like, “When we have a lot, we should give to other people!” I probably didn’t understand at that time. But perhaps it’s the reason why now, we like to share our bread with other people!

Twenty-seven years after we moved to Kaimuki, in 1989, we thought about rebuilding the church due to its deteriorated state from termite damage. But before that, my father wanted to see if the owners of the back property wanted to sell. The back property has an area of 5,000 square feet and two small houses. My dad and I visited the former owner of the back property who lived across the street at that time to ask if he and his wife, wanted to sell the property which they were renting out to other people. But they refused, saying that they were interested in purchasing our property. Seeing that the owner didn’t want to sell, we decided to rebuild the church instead.

We demolished the old church and built the new church in 1989. Five years later in 1994, I became the 3rd head minister.

Years passed with many different tenants, some were friendly and some were a little challenging. Through it all we tried to get along with whoever lived there. The most challenging was the last tenant who played loud music late into the night and often invited friends over for loud conversation, playing live rock music, and drinking parties. Neighbors would tell me to call the police. Although, at times, I wanted to call, I didn't because we make our share of noise as well whether it's our church services or some project I'm doing in the back. In addition, he saved his bottles and cans for our recycling fundraiser. Our faith teaches us that whatever happens is due to our causality or seeds that we have planted in our present or previous lives. So instead of complaining, I decided to thank him. Every two months or so, I would give him a 12 pack of Kirin beer and thanked him for saving the bottles and cans for us. Obviously, he was really happy to receive the beer. In this way I tried to maintain a good relationship.

In June of last year, we had the honor of having the Shinbashira visit our church. We were blessed with many of our members and friends to welcome and greet him.

As a side story, one of our Japanese home stay students who arrived ten days after the Shinbashira's visit said that she wanted to attend our evening service, which she did almost every night and even participated by copying our hand gestures. This was a first

for a non-Tenrikyo student staying at Pearl Church. We were pleasantly surprised. She asked many questions about Tenrikyo and we gave her whatever Tenrikyo material we had. She returned to Japan four weeks later and attended the basics course while we were there for the Children's Pilgrimage. She will be attending her first Besseki Lecture this April. I cannot help but feel it was due to the power of the Shinbashira's visit that we received the blessing of a Besseki attendee.

Getting back to our story... about a month after the Shinbashira's visit, the tenants of both houses in the back told me that they received notice from the property manager that they had to move out in 45 days, without any reason.

In September, the realtor representing the owners came to inspect the property and told us that the owners want to sell and that she will be listing the property very soon. Without really knowing whether we could afford it or not, I said that we would be very interested in purchasing the property. She then asked that we make an offer as soon as possible.

In pondering over the purchase of this property, I thought that if another person or family purchased the property, it could be decades or another lifetime before we could get another chance. This was a chance if at all possible, we couldn't miss. From about that time we started to do prayer service consisting of the seated service and 12

Songs teodori every night at 7:30pm.

After discussing the purchase of the property with key members of our church we decided to make an offer matching the asking price which we thought was very high. A few days later, we were told that the owners want the church to acquire the property, but asked that we submit another offer. After discussing with our key members, we made a slightly higher offer and they accepted. Later we found out that the owner, had two other offers that were still much higher, but for some reason the owner still wanted to sell to us. For whatever reason, it was a great blessing for us.

Generally speaking, people can buy property, if they have the money and the highest offer. But in this case, the owner sold the property to this church, even though they had higher offers. This is God's miraculous working.

Whatever miraculous and wondrous things happen, it proves that God is here. And we should not forget that this wondrous acquisition of the back property did not happen overnight, but it is due to the seeds of sincerity planted by previous generations in the faith, the performance of the salvation service and administering the sazukey, from the time of our first head minister, till now.

In return we too, in the present must continue to plant seeds of sincerity for our future generations.

In the Anecdotes of Oyasama story #90 "Deeper in the Second Generation than in the First,"

...virtue is more deeply planted in the second generation than in the first one, and deeper still in the third than in the second. By becoming ever deeper, it will become virtue which last forever. It depends on the mind of a man whether it lasts for one generation only, or for two or three generations, or forever. By the continuation of this virtue even a bad *innen* becomes a good one.

Also in the Osashizu, we read:

Because it continues, it can be called a path. Without continuity, it cannot be called a path. (May 21, 1906)

As can be seen from these words we must not only plant seeds of sincerity, but we must make sure that we pass on this faith to the next generation. Passing the faith to the next generation... This is what the Boys and Girls Association is about!

As head of the Boys and Girls Association Hawaii Chapter, I would like to urge all of you to support the BGA activities by encouraging your children to participate in the Spring Camp coming up next weekend at the Cultural Center, serve as a volunteer and come to the General Meeting this Saturday at 9:30am. Yoboku Gatherings (Honolulu Venue)

As an activity during the second year of the “three years, one thousand days” period towards the 130th Anniversary of Oyasama, the “Oyasama 130th Anniversary Yoboku Gatherings” was held at various venues in Hawaii. At Honolulu venue, Church Headquarters lecturer Rev. Toshikiyo Yukimoto, head minister of Central Fresno Church, spoke to 170 Yoboku and followers who gathered on Saturday, March 15 from 9:00 a.m. On that day, the participants separated into English- and Japanese-speaking groups.

With regard to the day of origin of Oyasama’s anniversaries, Rev. Yukimoto spoke of the intention of God the Parent for all human beings to live the Joyous Life and the importance of becoming joyous when conducting salvation work. Based on his own experiences, Rev. Yukimoto stated that while believing in God’s parental heart and blessings we receive, actually seeing and experiencing things firsthand are important elements when doing salvation work. Rev. Yukimoto emphasized by saying: “Especially when we encounter a knot, we should know that it is a guidance from God the Parent. It is then that we can feel the parental love of God the Parent.”

Following the Honolulu venue, the Yoboku Gatherings was held at Maui Church in Maui on Monday, 17th, at Kilauea Church in Hilo on Tuesday, 18th, and at Kailua Kona Church in Kona on Wednesday, 19th.

The Hungry Reporter

Asparagus is in season!! I went to Times a few days ago and found some for only \$1.69 a bunch! I remembered this great chicken recipe and decided to share! It's easy to make, takes little time and will Wow everyone at the table! Enjoy!

Chicken Asparagus Roll Ups

Ingredients:

1/2 Cup mayonnaise	1/2 tsp salt
3 Tbsp Dijon mustard	16 spears fresh asparagus, trimmed
1 lemon, juiced and zested	4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves
2 tsp dried tarragon	4 slices provolone cheese or mozzarella
1 tsp ground black pepper	1 Cup panko bread crumbs

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 475 degrees F (245 degrees C). Grease a baking dish with Pam. In a bowl, mix together the mayonnaise, Dijon mustard, lemon juice, lemon zest, tarragon, salt, and pepper until the mixture is well combined. Set aside.
2. Cook asparagus in a boiling pot of water until bright green and just tender, 1 to 1 1/2 minutes. Set the asparagus spears aside.
3. Place a chicken breast between two sheets of heavy plastic (resealable freezer bags work well) on a solid, level surface. Firmly pound the chicken breast with the smooth side of a meat mallet to a thickness of about 1/4 inch. Repeat with the rest of the chicken breasts.
4. Place 1 slice of provolone on each chicken breast, and top the cheese with 4 asparagus spears per breast. Roll the chicken breasts around the asparagus and cheese, making a tidy package, and place, seam sides down, in the prepared baking dish. With a pastry brush, apply a coating of the mayonnaise mixture to each chicken breast, and sprinkle each with panko crumbs, pressing the crumbs into the chicken to make a coating.
5. Bake in the preheated oven until the crumbs are browned and the chicken juices run clear, about 25 minutes.

Note: You can adjust this recipe with what works for you. Use regular breadcrumbs, use grated cheese if that's what you have on hand or even eliminate the zest of lemon. Make sure to keep the lemon juice included.
