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A Brief History of 60 years of the Path in Hawaii

The Fourth Bishop, Rev. Masanobu Yamamoto, and Pep Rally Commemorating the 30th Anniversary of Dendocho

In 1981, twenty-seven years since the establishment of Dendocho, and when Dendocho's missionary systems had been organized and the existence of Dendocho began to be known within the community, Rev. Masanobu Yamamoto, the former/fifth head minister of Shikinori Grand Church, was installed as the fourth bishop. Thinking about the future of the path in Hawaii, Bishop Yamamoto proposed to transfer Dendocho to the property - which had been used as a Culture Center and is four times larger than that of the current Dendocho. A plan that included the sanctuary and annex buildings furnished with various facilities was drawn, and the total budget for these was calculated to have been \$3,776,000.

Although the year 1984 marked the 30th Anniversary of Dendocho, Bishop Yamamoto, who desired to push forward the transfer plan, decided to hold a Pep Rally Commemorating the 30th Anniversary of Dendocho instead of conducting the 30th Anniversary Commemorative Service.

At the Pep Rally held on May 19, which aimed to encourage the nurturing and spiritual maturity of the succeeding generation of the path, in addition to the service with more participation from the Young Men's Association and Young Women's Club members, such events as a testimonial speech contest, Yoboku rally and historical photo exhibition was conducted. Due to Bishop Yamamoto's weakening legs and lower back, the Pep Rally was presided by his wife.

Bishop Yamamoto became bedridden about that time, and on March 17, 1986, soon after the Centennial Anniversary of Oyasama, he passed away for rebirth in his room at Dendocho at the age of seventy-six. The grand transfer plan of Dendocho died out with the passing of the bishop. What will it be like at the 100th Anniversary of Dendocho? Let us keep a glimmer of hope that the transfer plan, although it is a myth now, will be someday realized.

July Monthly Service Prayer

Appearing before You, God the Parent, Tenri-O-no-Mikoto, I (Shugo Yamanaka) Bishop of the Mission Headquarters of Hawaii speak with reverence on behalf of the Hawaii congregation.

Also, close to 30 people including adults will be returning to Jiba for the Children's Pilgrimage. It is our hope that the young members, who will be carrying the Path in Hawaii in the future, will experience the truth of the Jiba and receive the truth of the Parent as they sweat and plant valuable seeds of sincerity in Jiba during the midsummer days.

From the 4th until the 6th of this month, 80 members from Tenri Judo Club participated in the Junior U.S. Open Judo Tournament which was held here in Hawaii. Demonstrating the fruits of their daily training with pride, they were able to uplift the name of "Tenri" as they received outstanding results by bringing home 20 gold medals, 14 silver medals and 8 bronze medals.

Together we vow to accord with the intention of God the Parent, whose desire is for all humankind to live the Joyous Life, and as instruments of Oyasama we will walk firmly on the path of single-hearted salvation and single-heartedness with God here in Hawaii. We were faced with the sudden passing away for rebirth of the former Shinbashira on the 24th of last month. Upon receiving this big knot, each and every one of us is firmly determined to continue daily in making decisive efforts to grow spiritually as we approach the 130th Anniversary of Oyasama so that we may bring comfort and joy to the memorial of the former Shinbashira, who led us on the Path of single-hearted salvation for many years and also embraced the Path in Hawaii with his great parental heart. May You, God the Parent, accept our sincerity, and we ask that You guide us further towards the advancement of the Path in Hawaii and the reconstruction of the world into a Joyous Life World where everyone will live together in harmony helping and caring for one another even a day sooner. Together with all present, I sincerely pray that You bless us so.

Mission HQ July Monthly Service Sermon

Head Minister of Kalihi Church

Good morning. I have been assigned to give the sermon for this month in English. My acknowledgement and thanks to Rev. Tsunenori Ichise of Joyous Mission Station for accepting the task of translating my sermon into Japanese. May I have your attention for a short while.

Next year around this time, I will be 80 years old. I keep thinking to myself, “how did I get this old so fast?” It seems like just yesterday that I was young, just married and embarking on a new path in life as a professional engineer and second head minister of Kalihi Church.

Rev. Manabu Yama, the first head minister of Kalihi Church passed away for rebirth on April 3, 1969. Being the eldest son, I had to make a decision whether or not to accept becoming the second head minister. My church members and parent church head ministers informed me that I should accept since I was the first born male and my mother was deceased. All of my immediate family and relatives concurred that it was not my responsibility. The high school that I attended was a Catholic school and the teachers were priests or brothers of the faith. I talked to them and they all said that it was God’s calling that made



them become brothers or priests and no one urged them to make the decision. This kind of eased my mind. I thought to myself that maybe one of the devout members of the church or someone qualified from Japan can be the successor. But after a few months no one in Kalihi Church showed any interest in becoming the second head minister of Kalihi Church. There was no one from Japan who was willing to come to Hawaii. Just about that time, since my wife was from Aloha Church, one day Rev. Edward Kawasaki, head minister of Aloha Church heard of my predicament and offered me some advice. He also agreed that no one can force me to accept. But, he said, “Ron, think about this: if God the Parent wants you would you rather be healthy and accept or will you accept after you become sick or physically challenged

and need God's help?" After a month of pondering, I asked Rev. Kawasaki if God will allow me to quit if after trying I find it is not for me. His answer was: "Sure, God is forgiving. He will let you quit if you at least tried with sincere efforts and found it too difficult. Why not give it a try." That was around the end of year 1969. With Rev. Kawasaki's advice I finally made the decision and attended shuyoka in April of 1970. At that time there was no English spiritual development (shuyoka) class and sitting among the Japanese students was intimidating. But God the Parent made it bearable by having Mr. Melvin Iwata, a young man from Hawaii, whom I met for the first time, attend the same class with me. Together we managed to complete shuyoka. After receiving the Sazuke and completing the minister qualification courses I returned to Hawaii and Melvin went on to study in senshuka. Melvin later became the head minister of Honolulu Ko Church and a member of the Dendocho Board of Directors.

In November of 1970 I was appointed as second head minister of Kalihi Church. With only a few months as a head minister, in January of 1971, Bishop Kunio Matsuoka asked me to serve on the Dendocho's Board of Directors. A month later I was assigned to revive the Hawaii Tenrikyo English Newsletter and soon after, to head the Hawaii's young men's association. I was

kept so busy that there was no time to think about quitting my position as head minister. Rev. Kawasaki never mentioned about how God works to keep you on the Path.

Today I would like to talk about how grateful I am to have God the Parent's blessings now and throughout the past 44 years.

Sixty years ago I never even thought about how lucky I was to be alive and healthy and enjoying life each day with my family and friends. All of that was taken for granted. Fortunately, those years went by without any problems or bad incidents. I was never in any serious accident or had any serious injury or major illness requiring special doctor's care or long hospitalization. Each day went by practically without any concerns or regards for tomorrow.

At age 35, I succeeded my father and became the second head minister of Kalihi Church. Not knowing what the future had for me, I wholeheartedly participated in church work as diligently as I did my profession as a civil engineer and for thirty years I continued working while running a church. Having two jobs kept me constantly busy almost every day of the week. Monday to Friday I worked as an engineer from 7:30 am to 5:30 pm. Evenings, Saturdays, Sundays and holidays were dedicated to church work. Concerning church work, I was never the "door to door Nioigake" type. Instead my nioigake was

talking to or praying for members, relatives, friends and business associates who got sick, injured, or needed hospitalization; and counseling or providing prayer services such as office, new home or new car blessings, and conducting weddings and funerals. Of course, the Sazuke was administered as much as possible and participating in monthly services kept me busy every Sunday. Although my work schedule was quite demanding, I decided that every month on the 26th I take a day off from work to attend Yohaishiki at Dendocho and do church work for the rest of the day. I continued to do this until I retired from my engineering business. All the while I made sure I worked overtime on other days to make up for the time I took off to attend Yohaishiki because I was paid by salary and didn't want to take advantage of the engineering company, even though the owner of the company was very understanding and said that it was not necessary to do so. While attending college, I worked part-time as a junior engineer and after college I was given a full time position as a civil engineer. The owner of the company offered to pay for my tuition but I declined saying that it was better if I paid for it myself from the money I earned from the part-time work. I worked and studied diligently and as soon as I was eligible, I passed the State of Hawaii exam to get my license as a professional engineer. For

many years the company personnel were only the owner, his wife, some part-time engineers and draftsmen and me. So I had to do just about everything from janitorial duty to land surveying, drafting plans and doing simple engineering designs. But as the company grew and prospered I became a vice president and was given shares in the company, for which I was very grateful and pledged to support the company as long as possible.

At age 65, I finally retired after working at the same company for over 40 years. I was very grateful for being able to work and serve God for so long with no major physical, social, or financial problems, although I had to hurdle some minor hardships. I believe that it was possible due to God's blessings.

In the Mikagura Uta, Song IX verse 2,

**Against any hardship I will protect you;
so lean closely on the mind of God!**

I believe that by leaning on the mind of God I was able to overcome the hardship of working, while at the same time running a church with very little time to rest. I am also very thankful for the support and understanding I received from my wife, business associates, family, church members and friends. I thank Rev. Edward Kawasaki for his timely advice. But I regret not realizing it and thanking him until after

he passed away for rebirth.

As I mentioned earlier, I had the task of reviving the Tenrikyo Hawaii English Newsletter. The staff at that time had a very difficult time and struggled to get each issue out on time. There was no computer system so all of the typing was done by hand on a typewriter and on mimeograph sheets. Some of you may not even know what a mimeograph is, but that doesn't matter. It was the only way to run many copies on our limited budget. While the staff was busy running around gathering local news and pictures, Honbu's Overseas Mission Department also supported us by sending us many interesting photos and news items. Some of the staff is still here with us but unfortunately some have passed away for rebirth. Although the editor and staff members constantly changed, I am happy that the newsletter is still active after over forty years. I am glad that Bishop Matsuoka and his secretary, Rev. Yoshishige Murata, revived the English Newsletter. I thank everyone responsible for the continuance of the newsletter and for your diligent support.

As head of the Tenrikyo Hawaii Young Men's Association (THYMA) I was given valuable lessons on leadership, planning and management. The THYMA Hawaii Convention of 1974 gave us, the Hawaii members, the blessings of lifelong fellowship and friendship with members in

Japan, the US mainland and countless other countries. I thank the former Shinbashira, Zenye Nakayama, Rev. Masahiko Iburi and the Honbu and Hawaii YMA staffs for their valuable contribution in making the convention a rousing success. My experience with the THYMA also gave me confidence to continue as head minister of Kalihi Church.

While working I didn't have much time to spare but I was happy to be able to assist Dendocho in many of its planning, construction and repair work as my way of doing hinokishin. I still remember drawing a simple sales booth plan for the first Dendocho bazaar. I also remember working with Rev. Masami Meguro in preparing many studies for the Culture Center master plan and providing technical advice on countless other repair, renovation, and upgrading work. Mr. Thomas Agawa and Mr. Carl Nii also participated in providing various architectural plans and studies. But to our dismay, the proposed master plans and studies were just shelved and forgotten due to lack of funds, interest or support. Making full use of the Culture Center property will probably be with the next several generations. Life was a challenge filled with anxiety and frustration, but with hope for a better future.

I would like to mention a couple of the personal blessing I received. There are many fruit trees in my yard. Among them

are two large mango trees and an avocado tree. Every year I savored the time when I can pick the ripe fruits, give them to my friends, relatives and church members and see their happy faces. Thirty years ago, climbing the fruit tree was no problem. But as age crept up, it is different. Looking down from ten feet above the ground seems like I was twenty feet high. About eight years ago I fell down from a ladder from about eight feet up while trimming the avocado tree. Luckily I fell on dirt instead of on bricks that were there just a few days before. I had blacked-out for a few seconds but I got up and called for my wife for help. But just then I remembered that she went to Dendocho. Frantically I drove to Dendocho, prayed to God the Parent and Oyasama for help and drove back home. When I reached home I staggered onto the bed. The next day I couldn't get out of the bed. But with God's blessing I suffered only a sore back and not being able to walk for a few days. I was glad that I had cleared the concrete blocks a few days ago. I thought to myself what a disaster it might have been if the accident happened just a few days before and fell on the concrete blocks. With simple exercises and rest I was able to get back to normal. As taught in the Doctrine under the chapter on Divine Guidance, I believe that "God the Parent reduced the great misfortune to a small misfortune and a small misfortune

to no misfortune at all" so that I can "make progress in spiritual growth".

The following happened about fifteen years ago. My house is two storied and my son's bedroom is just above our kitchen. One day, I realized that ground termites damaged a major part of the walls and structural members of the kitchen. It was in imminent danger of the second floor collapsing if the damage wasn't repaired immediately. The repair work was estimated to cost about \$35,000.00. I called several banks for a loan but was politely refused since I was retired and did not have any income to repay the loan. My retirement account funds were insufficient to cover the cost so I was desperate and didn't know what to do. I also couldn't wait much longer. That is when I received God's blessing again. Just a few days later, knowing of my dilemma a friend called me and asked me if I knew about a special kind of mortgage called the reverse mortgage for senior citizens 62 years and older. I was 67 and my wife was 65 so we qualified. After a short one hour session, the reverse mortgage company's representative explained clearly and convinced us to accept. The reverse mortgage is a federal fund which allows us to borrow a large sum of money from the equity in my property, without having to make monthly payments, because it would payoff my regular mortgage. I could use the remainder of the loan in any way I desired

and we can live in the house for as long as my wife and I lived. Should we both pass away, our heirs can pay back the reverse mortgage and keep the house; or sell it, pay off the reverse mortgage and receive the net proceeds. Thus the kitchen was repaired and the house was back to being safe and livable. I feel that this was also a blessing from God the Parent for the many years of fervently following Oyasama's teachings.

About eight years ago, my knees started hurting and sitting down on the floor (seiza) was not possible. In my case, the cartilage between the bones is adequate but the ligament cannot stretch enough. I still can jog, walk, sit on a chair or bend down. The orthopedic surgeon informed me that there is no need to have surgery and the knees may heal in time. After receiving the Sazuke from Bishop Hamada, he suggested making more trips to the Jiba, since leg problem may signify "hakobi" or use of the legs for church-going, and Jiba is the place for salvation. When I mentioned my financing is limited, he suggested coming more often to Dendocho. I believe this is also God the Parent's way of showing us His parental love.

Thus when I look back, the forty three years I spent as a Tenrikyo minister is truly a blessing. Now each day is precious and I try to make it enjoyable and fulfilling. Every night I pray that tomorrow will be another precious day and hope that I move another

step closer to the joyous life. Except for the enlarged heart condition and the possibility of passing away at any moment, I am fine. I just need to stay away from any physical and mental stress and strain. Oyasama and God the Parent kept me busy so that I would continue performing the church services and administering the sazukey, and kept me out of trouble all these years. Now I realize that I made the right decision 44 years ago in accepting God's calling.

In May of this year the 60th Anniversary of the founding of Dendocho was successfully completed, with the presence of the Shinbashira and his wife. I thanked God the Parent and Oyasama for allowing me to participate in the last five anniversaries.

In October of 2012, we were given Instruction Three by the Shinbashira as a guidance in preparing for Oyasama's 130th Anniversary, which will be held on January 26, 2016. Let us diligently prepare ourselves mentally and physically by following the Instruction Three. I look forward to being able to attend the Service in 2016 with all of you.

The Hungry Reporter

I've been cooking with organic ingredients lately and I am happy to say that Costco and most local supermarkets are beginning to sell all kinds of organic options. Organic chicken tastes great. So I wanted to share this cilantro (Chinese parsley) & lime chicken recipe that's great for tacos, enchiladas or to top a nice salad. The cilantro makes this recipe pop!! I know you will enjoy this.

Slow Cooker Cilantro Lime Chicken

Ingredients:

- 1 (16 ounce) Jar Salsa
- 1 (1.25 ounce) Pkg Dry Taco Seasoning Mix
- 1 Lime, juiced
- 3 Tbsp Fresh Cilantro, chopped
- 3 lbs Skinless, Boneless Chicken Breast Halves

Directions:

1. Place the salsa, taco seasoning, lime juice, and cilantro into a slow cooker, and stir to combine.
2. Add the chicken breasts, and stir to coat with the salsa mixture. Cover the cooker, set to High, and cook until the chicken is very tender, about 4 hours. If desired, set cooker to Low and cook 6 to 8 hours. Shred chicken with 2 forks to serve. (Serves 6)
